We are set to begin our first pilot of registration workshops for all New to College Students slated to launch on May 23rd! This aligns with the open registration dates for out of area First Time New to College students and New International students.

Who:

These workshops are

for <u>any</u> New to College students who have completed class planning and need help registering into courses. Workshops are based on a first come, first served basis with a maximum capacity of 30 students, based on staffing.

Why:

Our registration workshops are meant to close the gap for all New to College students in their steps to enrollment and to ensure successful class registration. Our charge is to proactively contribute to increased enrollment for our campus community.

What:

We will be offering registration workshops staffed with:

- Counseling assistants (CA's) to help students with the actual registration process
- A counselor to assist students with updating their Summer/Fall 2024 course plan based on a change to their major or to help identify a substitute course in case the classes on their plan are full (i.e. due to late registration, etc.)

Where:

We will be offering these registration workshops on Zoom. The QR code on the flyer below takes students directly to the Zoom room. If students are joining from a computer, they can log into the Zoom room by going to Zoom.com and entering the Meeting ID and Passcode.

When:

We will be offering these registration workshops twice a week on Tuesdays 2PM-3PM and Thursdays 10AM-11AM throughout most of the entire summer starting on May 23rd and ending on August 22nd.
